Scrolls



Scroll1.jpg: Calendrical Document-4Q325 Parchment, Hebrew language Written 1st century B.C.E.

This document provides a record of the Sabbaths, first days of the months, and the festivals of the Dead Sea sect by priestly division and according to the solar calendar. The Dead Sea sect used a solar calendar of 364 days in the year thus the sectarian calendars were six years long rather than one. The solar calendar stood against the more popular 354 day lunar calendar used in the Temple. This lunar model was victorious in the calendar wars of the period and is still the form used by normative Judaism to this very day.

Scroll2.jpg: Community Rule-4Q260-366 Parchment, Hebrew language Written 1st century B.C.E. – 1st century C.E.

Also known as The Manual of Discipline, it contains rules ordering the communal life of the Dead Sea sect. The rules of life deal with the manner of joining the group, the relations between members, their way of life and their beliefs. The large number of surviving fragments of this scroll indicate its importance to the sect.

This manuscript is the best preserved copy of a previously unknown composition. A non-biblical vision about future events in Egypt relating to the people of Israel is revealed to Ezekiel. 




